

School Management

Governing Body

The school governors have important legal and supervisory functions in the school's management. They hold regular meetings and have informed knowledge of the life of the school. Working in conjunction with the Headteacher and Staff they ensure that the requirements of the Education Reform Act 1988 and supplementary statutory obligations are fulfilled. The normal term of office for a governor is four years.

The Staff

Our Head of School is responsible for the day-to-day organisation and management of the school and is supported by the Executive Headteacher. Our teaching staff are responsible for the educational and social welfare of the children in their care. They are supported by a team of Teaching Assistants and Higher-Level Teaching Assistants who work in each class. We have a School Office Manager and an Administrative Officer who deal with the day-to-day running of the school. We also have 2 lunchtime Play Leaders who look after the children at lunchtime while they are eating their lunch and whilst they are playing in the playground.





Our Aim is that, at eleven years of age, children will be confident and independent learners who can:-

- Read a variety of books and other texts with understanding and enjoyment
- Communicate clearly and confidently with adults and other children
- Write legibly and accurately for a variety of personal, practical and imaginative purposes
- Apply Mathematical skills and concepts in a variety of everyday settings
- Know how to obtain information from a variety of sources and record findings in a variety of ways
- Show an understanding of science and technology from firsthand experience
- Work with others to investigate, explore, interpret and solve problems
- Practise a range of skills and strategies in the creative arts
- Be able to talk responsibly about attitudes and values
- Show an awareness of historical and geographical perspectives in relation to the present age and the local environment
- Show an awareness of religious and cultural traditions

What Do We Teach? The National Curriculum

The revised National Curriculum, introduced in 2014 comprises the core subjects of Mathematics, English and Science. These are the subjects central to the whole curriculum and on which most time will be spent. It also includes the foundation subjects of History, Geography, Design and Technology, Information and



Communication Technology, Music, Art, Physical Education and French. Religious Education and Personal Social & Health Education are also to be taught in the remaining time.

Programmes of study reflect attainment targets and set out the minimum content which pupils are to be taught at various stages within the core and foundation subjects. Prescribed levels of attainment establish the knowledge, skills and understanding our pupils should normally be expected to have at the ages of seven and eleven.

The object of the exercise is to enable a pupil's progress to be measured against national standards, and give children, teachers, and parents a clear idea of what is expected within the framework of Key Stages. We also teach the Foundation Stage in Reception (EYFS) and teach upon a cross curricular basis so that our youngest children can use their skills across the whole curriculum.

Key Stage One commences when a child starts Year 1 and ends at the close of the academic year in which they are seven in Year 2. There is also the Foundation Stage (EYFS) which covers the period prior to KS1 when children start school.

Key Stage Two follows Key Stage One and ends at the close of the academic year in which the child reaches eleven years of age in Year 6.

Across the whole school we teach in a knowledge rich manner and our philosophy is to teach upon a project/topic basis. Our aim is to give our pupils great enthusiasm and the time to investigate new learning. We enrich our activities with a range of themed days, trips and visitors to enhance our learning experiences.





Religious Education

Children attend daily acts of worship and study religious education, but it is open to parents to request that their child should be wholly or partly excused from Collective Worship. Any such request should be made to the Head of School. Religious Education is delivered following an agreed syllabus provided by the Bath and Wells Diocese. We teach a rolling programme of topics covering all major world faiths and humanism.

Special Educational Needs and Disability

Our School's Assessment and diagnostic programme provides clear guidance for diagnosing and referring children with social, speech and language, physical and learning difficulties. Most children are catered for within the context of the class situation and the school employs a Special Educational Needs Specialist to ensure our provision matches the needs of our children.

The Somerset Local Authority's Educational Psychological and Advisory Service provide ongoing back-up to the school to ensure our provision is the best it can be.

Sex and Relationships Education

It is the policy of the school that sex education should form part of the curriculum. The delivery of this area of the curriculum shall be at a level appropriate to the child's age, interest and ability to understand and fulfils National Best Practice Guidelines. We currently use materials from "Jigsaw" from Year 1 up to Year 6.

Jigsaw covers all statutory guidance upon Personal, Social and Health Education. Our Sex Ed policy can be seen on our website and is supported by guidance from the Church of England's "Valuing All God's Children" report.

Home Learning

Home learning is used to reinforce, practice or revise work completed in school.

- To develop improved home-school communication and to provide an opportunity for parents and teachers to communicate with each other regarding homework matters.
- To clearly identify and explain all homework that is set, so that teachers' expectations are made very clear.

 To encourage children to read at home, both alone and with their parents and to provide parents with prompts, to support them in working with their child.



As Parents we ask you to:

- Read daily with your child.
- Encourage your child to complete their homework and to do their best.
- Praise your child when they have completed their homework well.
- Contact us if any aspect of homework is causing you concern.

Reading is a major focus throughout the school and children will be required to read independently or to an adult at least four times a week. As a child moves through the school, there is a clear progression in the amount of time that they will spend doing homework.





Music Tuition

We subscribe to the Somerset Music Service. Children receive tuition to play instruments such as recorders, violins, clarinets, ukuleles and singing.

Admission Arrangements and Reception Class Inductions

Children are admitted to school in September during the Year that they reach 5 years of age. Children begin school in a single intake in September. (For Children born between September ft and August 35t.)

Prospective pupils will be invited to visit the school prior to their admission and for children starting in September in Reception we offer three afternoons in June/July for the children to stay in school and experience their new setting. Parents considering sending their children to the school are encouraged to visit and should contact the Head Teacher for an appointment. Our induction to school for new reception children takes place over the first days of term in September.

We will endeavour to ensure that all new children receive the best possible introduction to school, and should children require extra time to begin school we approach each child upon an individual needs basis.



Charging Policy

Parents may be asked to voluntarily contribute to the cost of Residential Visits and Educational Outings, where the visits constitute an enhancement to the curricular work of the pupils, or from outside the curriculum.

School Meals

Mid-day meals are provided and are prepared at Wadham Secondary School. The current cost of the meals service is £2.65 per day. Free School Meals are available to families who are in receipt of certain benefits and currently all infant children in the EYFS, Year 1 and Year 2. If you think you may be eligible to access free school meals this will also benefit the school as we are eligible for up to £1400 extra funding per child for children entitled to the pupil premium.

In the interest of promoting a healthy diet, the school encourages only fresh fruit and vegetables as a break time snack. Children in the Infants, Phoenix Class, receive free fruit or vegetables daily, provided by the government.

Attendance

Children must attend school at all times unless they are ill and parents are requested to contact the school by 9.15am if the child is absent for whatever reason. The school discourages any pupil from taking time off during term time for holidays. If holiday is taken during term time, a Penalty Notice may be issued by Somerset Council and fines can be issued to both parents, including non-resident parents.

Medical And Dental Appointments

It is expected that routine appointments for medical and dental needs should be made outside of school hours.

All absences have now to be justified by law and an official record kept.

Sanctions

We believe in the education of the whole child within a Christian, safe, caring and positive environment. We aim to create a community where good behaviour is encouraged through mutual respect, praise and reward. All members of the school community are appreciated and

valued as individuals and are always given the opportunity to succeed. We believe that for effective teaching and learning to take place, it is essential that good behaviour is present.

School Rules

School rules are limited to those that preserve the safety and well-being of the pupils, the necessity of respecting other children, adults and their property.

Regular reminders are given to children as to the rules and acceptable standards of behaviour.

READY!

We always follow instructions from a known adult in school.



RESPECTFUL!

We always speak kindly and respectfully to each other.



SAFE!

We always keep ourselves safe and we never hurt others.





Behaviour and Relationships Policy:

At St Mary and St Peter's Church School, we support all children in making safe and respectful choices to ensure they are ready to learn. Our behaviour and Relationships policy supports seeing every child as individual and understanding the reasons behind behaviour. We strongly believe in building trusting relationships between adult and child promoting self-esteem, selfworth and high expectations.

PIP/RIP: All staff follow the PIP/RIP model when addressing behaviour.

Praise in Public; Reprimand in Private; Be clear, calm & firm

- Praise should always be as specific, targeted, public and as sincere as you can make it. This is what gives it power:
- Reprimand should be calm, private conversations or re-directions that only the child who it is intended for can hear.

- Speak to children calmly, with the greatest of respect, and be positive.
- We never shout, express negativity, or use sarcasm and derogatory tones.

Rewards

Children are rewarded in a variety of ways at Shepton Beauchamp including verbal praise, stickers, postcards home the Wall of Fame, Class Rewards, 'Friday's Child.' and our Family Assemblies in school every week.

School Uniform

We ask you to ensure that your child attends school appropriately dressed so that he/she will develop a positive attitude towards school both as a community, and as a place of work. If any family needs support for maintaining school uniform, please do get in touch with us. We are here to help.

Partnership With Parents

We believe that for your child to achieve their potential, it is crucial that we, the staff at the school, and you, our families, work in close partnership. You are always welcome to come and discuss issues with us. Should you have a concern, please let us know.

The earlier you involve us, the faster we can help to find solutions.

If you need an appointment with the Headteacher please make an appointment via the Administrative Officer, Mrs Salzer. In an emergency, somebody would obviously be available to see you at once.

We provide a Newsletter to parents every fortnight and regular posts are made on our Facebook site. We aim to be as comprehensive as possible, whilst retaining our small school family feel, providing you with all the latest news from the school.

You will find a large notice board for Parents' Notices in the playground of the school. This displays information relevant not only to education but also the local area. There are many ways in which you can help us with individual children or groups. The staff are delighted to have assistance with cooking, gardening, sewing, listening to children read and educational visits.

If you can spare a little time, please contact the school office. Stautory checks will then be carried out as a matter of routine and include a DBS Safeguarding check that helps us Safeguard all of our children on site.

Parent-Teacher Consultations

Formal Parent Teacher/Parent meetings are held twice a year. It should be emphasised that parents are always welcome to come in and discuss their child's needs whenever required.

Friends of Shepton School (FOSS)

All parents who have a child attending our School are automatically members of FOSS. The welfare of the school is the prime motivation of FOSS. It offers all parents the opportunity to support the work of the school.

FOSS acts on two levels - as a fund-raising body and as a social function. All funds raised go directly into supporting <u>our school</u>. Any support is greatly appreciated.





What Happens If Something Goes Wrong

Insurance

All pupils are insured against injuries caused by building defects, etc. and accidents which occur as a result of negligence by a member of the school's teaching and nonteaching staff. Pupils attending the Bath and Wells Multi Academy Trust schools are not insured against personal injury or accident while on education premises or taking part in recognised activities outside the school.

The BWMAT expects all employees, pupils and students to accept full responsibility for their personal possessions, including money, and to consider taking out insurance themselves to cover any risks.

Health

The School Nurse Team involves both health screening and health education plus advice on health-related matters or general concerns of your child. This covers all aspects of health care - vision and hearing screening, dental care and so forth.

In cases of accidents or illness at school, appropriate action will be taken, and parents contacted. The school maintains up-to-date records of emergency contacts.

Complaints And Grievances

Parents are particularly requested to discuss matters of complaint or grievance in the first instance with the Class Teacher and then with the Head Teacher. In the event that the matter cannot be resolved, The Governing Body will then consider the complaint, for further information please see our Complaints Policy on our website.


